Faith Community Nursing...Karen Kline

When I was five years old my maternal grandmother died from breast cancer. At the time we lived about two hours from my grandparents and at a certain point my mother stayed "in the city" caring for her mother. On weekends my father and I would go to be with family. I have memories of my grandmother lying in a hospital bed in the dining room of their home. Because the cancer had spread to her bones, she was in a full body cast to help prevent spontaneous fractures and minimize pain.

I always wondered as I got older why she didn't get routine mammograms. The simple reason; they were not available at the time! In 1949 and 1950 there were several studies done pioneering the interest in mammography. Raul Leborgne brought attention to the need for technical positioning and radiologic parameters to be used. He was a forerunner in the enhancement of imaging quality as well as emphasizing the diagnosis of benign and malignant abnormalities.

In the late 60's mammography units were developed for testing and the subsequent development of digital mammography became a priority... we now accept them as pretty much routine. Digital imaging not only produces clearer images, but allows for adjusting the image for greater detail. The process is faster and has less discomfort for the patient.

Amazing what God has given us with the ability of man to conceive and develop such advanced methods of cancer detection and the ability to treat and possibly cure early breast cancers!
